IPL's Green Power Option

If you have ever considered signing up for the Green Power Option offered by Indianapolis Power & Light Company (IPL), now might be the time. Recently the cost of participation, which is ever changing depending on market prices, has dropped markedly. My husband and I have been enrolled for the past five years, and I was amazed to see that the supplemental cost for the green power charge on our monthly bill was only 68 cents in both January and February.

In 2008 I researched and wrote an article in *Indiana Living Green* on the subject of local green power programs. I had wondered: Are these programs effective at encouraging the markets in alternative power? Or are they merely a voluntary tax on environmentally aware do-gooders? I concluded that it was one of the only ways that my individual action could help show public demand for green power. How else can we demonstrate to our state legislators that we want an alternative to burning coal? It may take a while for policy and legislative efforts to catch up with our values. Meanwhile, we are helping to encourage new energy from wind, solar, and biomass sources.

In IPL's December 2011 letter to program participants, Glenn Livers, the program's manager, indicated that 4,099 customers were enrolled. Participation has increased a little every year over the 10-year history of the program, and enrolled customers tend to remain loyal. However, this figure equates to less than 1% of its 450,000 customers. A national report on consumer attitudes towards renewable energy concluded that only one in six

consumers is aware of the green power option offered by their utility company. More than 850 utility companies across the U.S. offer their customers these voluntary programs. Last year's report by the Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory ranked IPL's option as number one for offering the lowest incremental cost to its customers.

In 2011, IPL's green power customers' purchases of renewable energy accounted for about 88,000 metric tons of avoided CO2 emissions, which is equivalent to removing more than 17,000 cars from the road for a year. Clearly that is a contribution to the environment. Please consider hopping on the bandwagon! You can enroll online at www.IPLpower.com.

On a Quest To Protect Our Birds

For 25 years the Amos Butler Audubon Society has been raising funds for special projects, both local and global, through its annual Birdathon. In 2011 the accumulated grand total reached a milestone of a half million dollars! Our projects in Latin America to preserve winter habitat for our birds have always been alluring to our donors. Several of this year's local projects will introduce youngsters to the joys of birding, hopefully creating some budding conservationists in the process.

We are committed to funding these projects to carry out our mission of "Promoting the enjoyment and stewardship of the birds of Central Indiana:"

- The purchase and protection of prime habitat for the Cerulean Warbler in central Colombia. Through our long-time partner, the American Bird Conservancy, and its partner, Fundación ProAves, this year's funds will go toward enlarging the Pauxi Pauxi Reserve and providing a shelter for forest guards in a remote area.
- Habitat restoration at Marian University's EcoLab. Thousands of students and adults have participated in restoration and conservation work at the EcoLab. Birdathon donations will continue to provide funds to purchase native vegetation used to replace invasive plants.

- A Purdue-sponsored study of the impacts of wind farms in Benton County on the American Golden-Plover. Previous research has shown that this area of Indiana is of global significance to this migratory species.
- The Eagle Creek Park Ornithology Center. This specialized nature center is all about birds and is designed to educate the public on the ecological and aesthetic role of birds in the environment.
- The purchase of binoculars for school children. The ability to see birds up close will encourage their appreciation of birds and inspire them to become future conservation champions.

Birdathon Teams Will Be on a Species Quest

Birdathon teams will be scouring the state during May to count the maximum number of species possible in a 24-hour period and asking donors to sponsor their efforts. If you don't know a team member, you could choose to make a donation directly to the Birdathon. Either way, your dollars will go far to ensure the future of our Indiana birds.
